To the Men of the Armed Services:

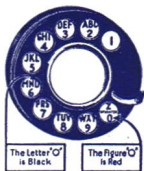
At this sign of the Blue Bell, which marks the locations of public telephones, you will find a friendly, courteous service.

There are more than 55,000 of these public telephones in New York City. So wherever you are — at the Battery or in The Bronx, in Times Square or Coney Island — you are never far from a telephone you can use.

To help you in making the best use of these public telephones, we've prepared this little booklet. It tells how to make local and out-of-town calls and how to use the directories. It contains other information which we hope will also be helpful to you while in New York City.

Extremely heavy use of the wires for war purposes makes it impossible at times for us to handle calls as speedily as we would like. We can't build more lines now because the materials are going into the shooting side of the war. You will find, though, that our operators and all others concerned with your calls are always "in there pitching," doing their level best to give you the fastest service they can under wartime conditions.

HOW TO USE A DIAL COIN TELEPHONE

1. Look up the number in directory if you don't already know it or are not absolutely sure of it.
2. Check list of five-cent call points on black-and-white card in booth.
3. Deposit nickel. Remove the receiver from the hook. Listen for dial tone — a steady humming sound. It means the equipment is ready to receive your call. If you don't hear it, hang up and try again after a few seconds.

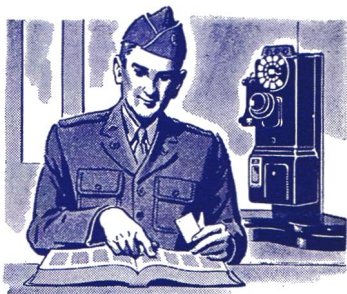
If call is to five-cent point, dial first TWO letters of central office name and then all figures in the number. For example, to dial Bowling Green 9-9970, dial black letter B. Then dial black letter O and the red figures 9—9-9-7-0.

If call is more than five cents, dial "Operator."

When you hear a burr-burr-burr sound, the called telephone is ringing.

If you hear a buzz-buzz-buzz sound, the called telephone is busy. Hang up and call later.

If you have trouble dialing a number, hang up for a few seconds. Then re-insert the coin, dial "Operator" and the operator will help you.



LOOKING UP TELEPHONE NUMBERS

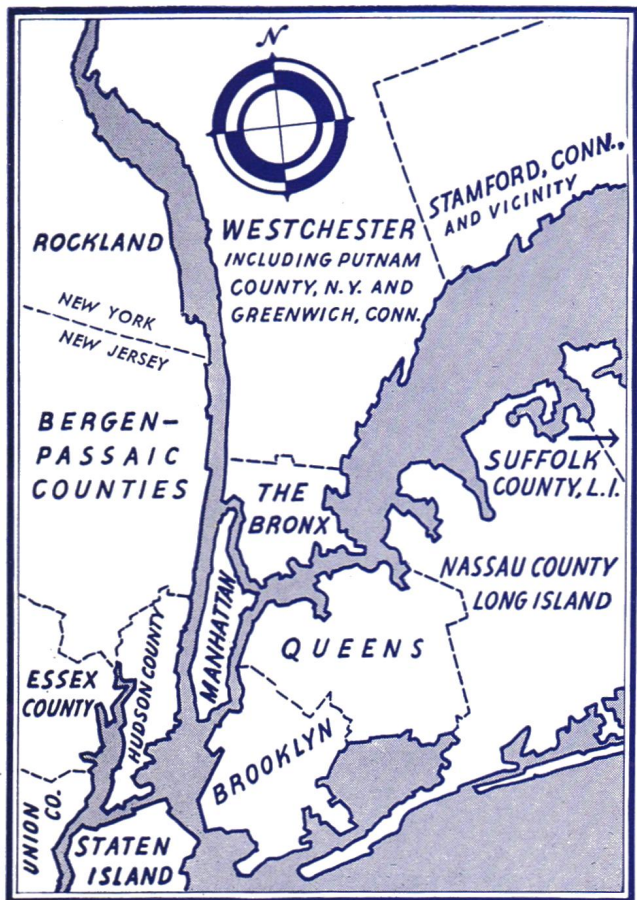
To save your time be sure you have the right number before you dial.

Most cities have only one telephone directory. There are five directories in New York City, one for each borough. These are named on the covers:

MANHATTAN	THE BRONX	BROOKLYN
QUEENS	STATEN ISLAND

Memorandum paper for your use in jotting down telephone numbers is supplied at many public telephones, directly above the directory shelf. There is space in the back of this booklet for numbers you may want to call again.

“THE VOICE WITH A SMILE”... IN PERSON

To find what street is nearest, take the house or building number, cancel last figure, divide by 2, add or subtract key number found below. The result will be the nearest street.

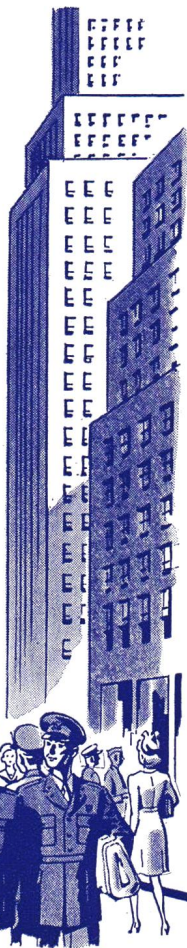

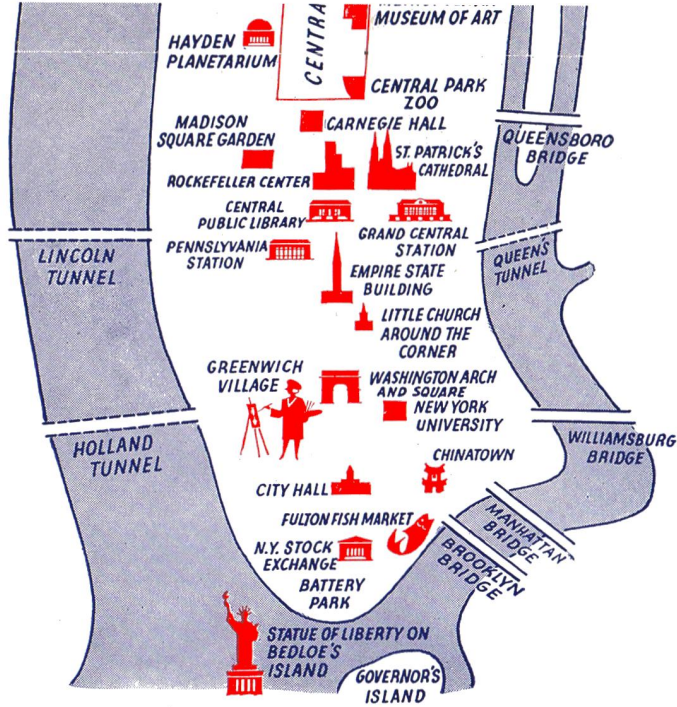

CROSS STREETS

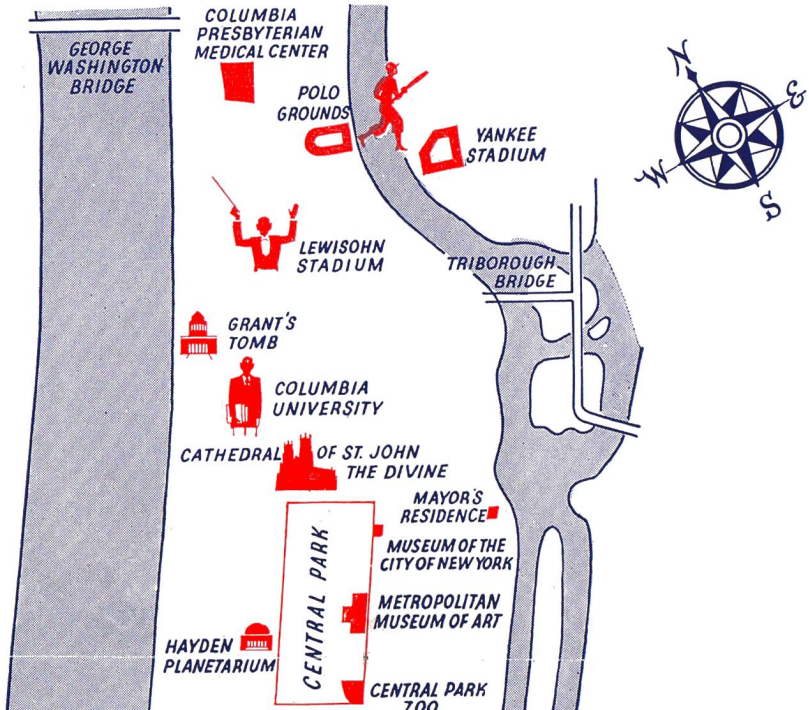
Numbers on cross streets in Manhattan run east and west from Fifth Avenue.

OUT-OF-TOWN CALLS

STATION-TO-STATION CALLS

If you will talk with anyone who answers the number you are calling, it is a station-to-station call. This is generally satisfactory when calling home. It is cheaper than a person-to-person call.

To make a station-to-station call, dial "Operator" and give her the name of the town and the number, such as "Albany 3-6522."

PERSON-TO-PERSON CALLS

When you want to reach a particular person or

to be connected with a particular extension telephone served by a private switchboard, that is a person-to-person call.

To make a person-to-person call, dial 211 and give the operator the place, number and name of the person wanted, such as "Albany 3-6522—Miss Ann Warrick." This type of call may be preferable on a business call. It costs a little more.

COLLECT CALLS

If you want the charge for an out-of-town call to be put on the bill of the called party, tell the Operator when you make the call that it is a "Collect Call." If someone at the called telephone agrees to accept the charges, you will be connected.

Collect calls cost no more than other out-of-town calls, except in the case of station-to-station calls having a basic charge of 20 cents or less.

RATES

Rates to places frequently called by service men from public telephones in New York City are shown on the last page. There are tables of rates in the various New York City directories, and attendants at public telephones will be glad to tell you the exact rate to the place you want to call.



WAR'S ON THE WIRES TOO

War has placed a tremendous burden on long distance telephone lines. At times there just aren't enough lines to handle all the calls without delay, and more can't be built right now.

The copper, aluminum and rubber we would need for additional telephone lines and equipment is going instead into tanks, ships, guns and planes. A machine gun, for instance, spits out enough copper in four minutes to make a mile and a half of telephone wire.

Your chances of getting a "green light" for your call are better if you will make as many of them as

possible during periods when telephone wires are not so busy. On week days, long distance wires leading from New York City are least busy before 10 o'clock in the morning, around noon, and after 9 o'clock in the evening. On Sunday the traffic is generally lighter and it is an especially good day to call the folks back home. Reduced rates are also in effect all day Sunday as well as every week-day night after 7 p.m.

Make your calls when possible outside the busy hours. You'll get better service when we don't have so many calls all at one time.
