A Prophecy Fulfilled

EARS AGO. Alexander Graham Bell, the genius who discovered the telephone principle, visioned that "cables could be laid underground or suspended overhead . . . " The fulfillment of this prophecy is the basis of this picture. First are scenes of early telephone equipment, old style switchboards: central offices with boys as operators: telephone poles overburdened with cross arms and wires. Then follow pictures of the compact and storm-resisting telephone cables of today. Includes views of "pulling in" the cables— aerial, underground and submarine. Closes with interesting scenes of cable manufacture, such as the huge wire spindles whirling at tremendous speed: the heavy presses that apply the lead covering and others of equal interest.



THE STORY of the unusual, rather than the usual, use of the telephone. Their discussion is illustrated by scenes showing the use of the telephone in transatlantic telephony; by the police and forest fire wardens; on railroads, and ocean liners; in newspaper offices; by taxicabs and department stores; depth-sounding crews; divers; and closes with interesting shots of the telephone in the world war and in air mail service.

HIS SUBJECT has for its theme, television, the scientific marvel which makes it possible to see as well as hear over the telephone. The story opens with views of Alexander Graham Bell's workshop in Boston and traces briefly the development of the telephone from 1875, when Bell discovered the principle of telephony, to the present day with its telephone laboratory of 2,000 scientists engaged in telephone research and experimentation. The first public demonstration of television is portrayed and the principles underlying its operation are demonstrated. It includes the views of the first public demonstration of television when President Gifford, of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, in New York City talked with Herbert Hoover in Washington.


Long Drawn Out

My Hero



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
Protecting Our Forests

And finally, pictures, in magnified form, are flashed on the screen showing the structure of lines, so fine as to be almost invisible to the naked eve. that compose the picture.


The World's Telephone Workshop

Bill's questions concerning the cables in the manhole give the cable splicer something to explain, but he tells Bill the complete story. The boys later become heroes of the neighborhood when their underground telephone line plays a leading role in saving the life of Bill's little sister. DRAMATIC historical record of the discovery and debut of the telephone. The principal characters are Alexander Graham Bell, the inventor, and Thomas A. Watson, his assistant. This film is an actual reproduction of what occurred when the first spoken words were heard over a telephone instrument; shows its exhibition at the Philadelphia Centennial, and pictures the operation by boys of the early telephone switchboard. 
A Desert Span

The wife chides her husband for having wasted money upon such an extravagant tov as the telephone, but he has great faith in its future. By the use of ingenious animations, the audience follows the growth of telephony and sees the voice bridge both the continent and the ocean. The couple who argued the merits of the telephone 50 years ago, receive a telephone call from their granddaughter in Sweden advising them of her safe arrival. The picture concludes with a discussion of the great communication network that has been built up in their life-time.

Many European countries are visited and an interesting contrast may be drawn between the equipment used in these countries and ours.


Characteristics of Sound

TUDENTS AND laymen alike after seeing this picture, realize more than ever, the vast amount of research work that is being done by the Bell Telephone Laboratories in the development of equipment to record and transmit a wide range of sound frequencies. The picture features Mr. W. W. Simons, a sound engineer, assisted by an instrumental quartet. With the aid of a Filter Control Board, he demonstrates the distortions that take place when the low and high frequencies are eliminated in instrumental music, and in the talking and singing voice. His ability to eliminate the different frequencies at will, enable him to give a remarkably clear demonstration of the characteristics of sound. The picture is excellently adapted for use in schools and for lecture purposes.


Engineering the Sound Film

HE NATURAL question for the public to ask, is "who gave the screen its voice". A personally conducted trip through the Bell Telephone Laboratories settles that question in a few moments. As the audience progresses on its tour, it is astounded by the vast scope of research work being done in this field alone. One of the extraordinary things seen, is the Recording Light Valve, the device which changes the electrical vibrations coming from the microphone into light waves which in turn photographed by a motion picture cam-The acoustical treatment of the recording studio is another interesting phase of the visit which is concluded by a demonstration showing how sound is reproduced for the "talkies" by both the sound-on-disc and sound-on-film processes.

THE PLACE where sound begins is at the great Hawthorne Plant of the Western Electric Company, near Chicago, Ill., where in addition to making telephone equipment, motion picture recording and reproducing apparatus is manufactured. The visitor sees giant machinery stamping out large pieces of metal, while precision machines turn out the delicate super-sensitive parts. The attendant noises of the big workshop suddenly give way to the beautiful strains of a medley of Victor Herbert's favorites, as an orchestra appears, bringing the picture to a close.

This picture takes us through the streets of Chinatown to the exchange where we listen in at the switchboard, hear the strange mixture of tongues and catch some of the oddities of the service.

We hear a call put in by a local merchant to his branch office in London and follow it across the continent and the Atlantic into the famous Limehouse District of London. The picture has a running accompaniment of characteristic Oriental music.


The Flying Telephone

THIS PICTURE centers around a bedtime story told by Uncle Jim. A part of his audience is a mother and her

small son and daughter.

As the youngsters tune in on Uncle Jim, he begins his tale of the Fir and the Pine whose ambitions were to become Christmas trees. The Fir's wish is fulfilled, but the Pine is cut and dressed to become a telephone pole.
