CORRIGAN FLIGHT SCOOPED BY OVERSEAS CALL

"Oh Mr. Corrigan, You're wanted on the phone." Those were the first words heard by Douglas Corrigan of Long Beach, Calif., after he brought his "crate" to a stop on Baldonnel airport runway at the end of his "mistake" flight from Floyd Bennett airport in New York. Harry F. Reutlinger, city editor of the Chicago Evening American, was on the other end of the line, merely up to his old tricks, scooping the nation's press with a well-timed telephone call.

Reutlinger was the first to break the story of the arrival of the quintuplets; put in a call for Dr. Dafoe and spoke to him 6:30 a. m. on the morning of the birth, in North Bay, Callander, Ontario. He got his lead from a short squib on the wire. And there was the time, too, when he had socialite Vesta Culbertson giving him a running description of the coronation ceremonies last year in London.

But the telephone call to Corrigan topped them all. Word came over the wire that a plane, evidently American, was sighted over the north coast of Ireland about 10 a.m. CDST. Reutlinger had seen a report that Corrigan had disappeared after taking off from Floyd Bennett airport supposedly for Los Angeles; put two and two together; assumed that the mysterious flier was Corrigan, and put in a transoceanic telephone call for Corrigan at both Baldonnel airport in Ireland and Croyden in England.

Corrigan came to the telephone at Baldonnel at 10:35 a.m. Chicago time; had nothing but the most matter-of-fact remarks to make about his remarkable flight, and made his unbelievable assertion that he made the passage "by mistake." Then the telephone connection was broken for a few minutes, but Reutlinger again got Corrigan on the wire at 10:45, and asked him to please not joke about the flight, only to have Corrigan twice reiterate his "mistake" assertion under direct pleading.

Reutlinger was rather surprised that the press should make so much of what he considers a workaday reporting job. —Editor & Publisher.

TELEPHONE NUMBERS IN ADS PRODUCE BUSINESS

Advertisements which carry a telephone number bring greater results than do advertisements without telephone numbers, according to a recent survey of advertisers.

An article in "Editor & Publisher" tells how emphasizing the telephone number in one advertisement increased the inquiries by 61 per cent.

Pennsylvania was chosen for the survey because it offers a variety of population, business conditions, and population groupings. As a result of the combined experiences of several hundred businesses and of 86 newspapers, it was found that including the advertiser's telephone number increased the effectiveness of newspaper advertisements, except for advertisements of stores selling strictly cash-and-carry items of low unit cost.

Listing the telephone number in advertisements of higher priced products was not regarded merely as a means of closing sales, but as a quick means of supplying additional information which led customers to come into the store to buy. It was found important, however, that stores which list telephone numbers in their advertisements should be equipped to handle incoming calls efficiently and to have calls handled by people trained in telephone selling. — Indiana Telephone News.
