By 1976 it will be established in 27 cities around the country.

Because to prepare for it means building and installing a new kind of network over the framework of the existing one.

And it means creating a different kind of telephone circuit. (Transmitting a picture over phone wires requires a circuit capacity 300 times wider than the one that carries a voice.)

As facilities grow, users will find countless new possibilities for Picturephone service.

Discussing layouts, viewing charts, and getting computer information via a Picturephone/computer hookup are just a few of the areas being pursued right now.
